

A summary of the adult social care sector and workforce in Hartlepool 2022/23



Skills for Care is the strategic workforce development and planning body for adult social care in England. We work with employers, Government, and partners to ensure social care has the right people, skills, and support required to deliver the highest quality care and support, now and in the future. Our role is to respond and adapt to the emerging trends and needs within social care, using data and evidence to drive forward widescale change.

The information within this summary has been produced by Skills for Care using the Adult Social Care Workforce Data Set (ASC-WDS). We use the data collected by the ASC-WDS to create workforce models that, in turn, allow for estimates of the whole adult social care workforce and its characteristics to be produced. The * notation indicates the figure has been suppressed.

Size and structure of the workforce

In 2022/23 the adult social care sector in England had an estimated 18,000 organisations with 39,000 care-providing locations and a workforce of around 1.79 million posts.



The total number of posts in Hartlepool was around 4,100 in 2022/23. This was comprised of 3,600 filled posts and 450 vacancies. Since the previous year, the total number of posts were similar, the number of filled posts has decreased by 75 (-2%) and the number of vacancies has increased by 50 (10%).

There were an estimated 3,600 filled posts in adult social care, split between local authorities (8%), independent sector providers (71%), posts working for direct payment recipients (13%) and other sectors (7%). As at March 2023, Hartlepool contained 41 CQC-regulated services; of these, 27 were residential and 14 were non-residential services.

If the workforce grows proportionally to the projected number of people aged 65 and over then the total number of adult social care posts in the North East region will increase by 21% (from 94,000 to 114,000 post) between 2022/23 and 2035.

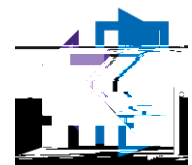
From here on, the figures in this report refer to the 2,900 filled posts in the independent sector and local authority in Hartlepool only. Filled posts in other sectors are not included.

The independent sector information in this report was collected between April 2022 and March 2023, and local authority information dates from September 2022.

Recruitment and retention

Skills for Care estimates that the staff turnover rate in Hartlepool was 25.3%, which was similar to the region average of 26.4% and lower than England at 28.3%. Not all turnover results in workers leaving the sector, around three quarters (71%) of starters were recruited from within the adult social care sector, therefore although employers need to recruit to these posts, the sector retains their skills and experience.



We estimate that the vacancy rate in Hartlepool was 12.10%, which was higher than the regional average of 8.7% and similar to England at 9.9%.

Across England, the vacancy rate has decreased compared to last year and the number of filled posts has increased. During this period international recruitment increased substantially which has impacted these trends.

Workers in Hartlepool had on average 10.4 years of experience in the sector and 82% of the workforce had been working in the sector for at least three years.
